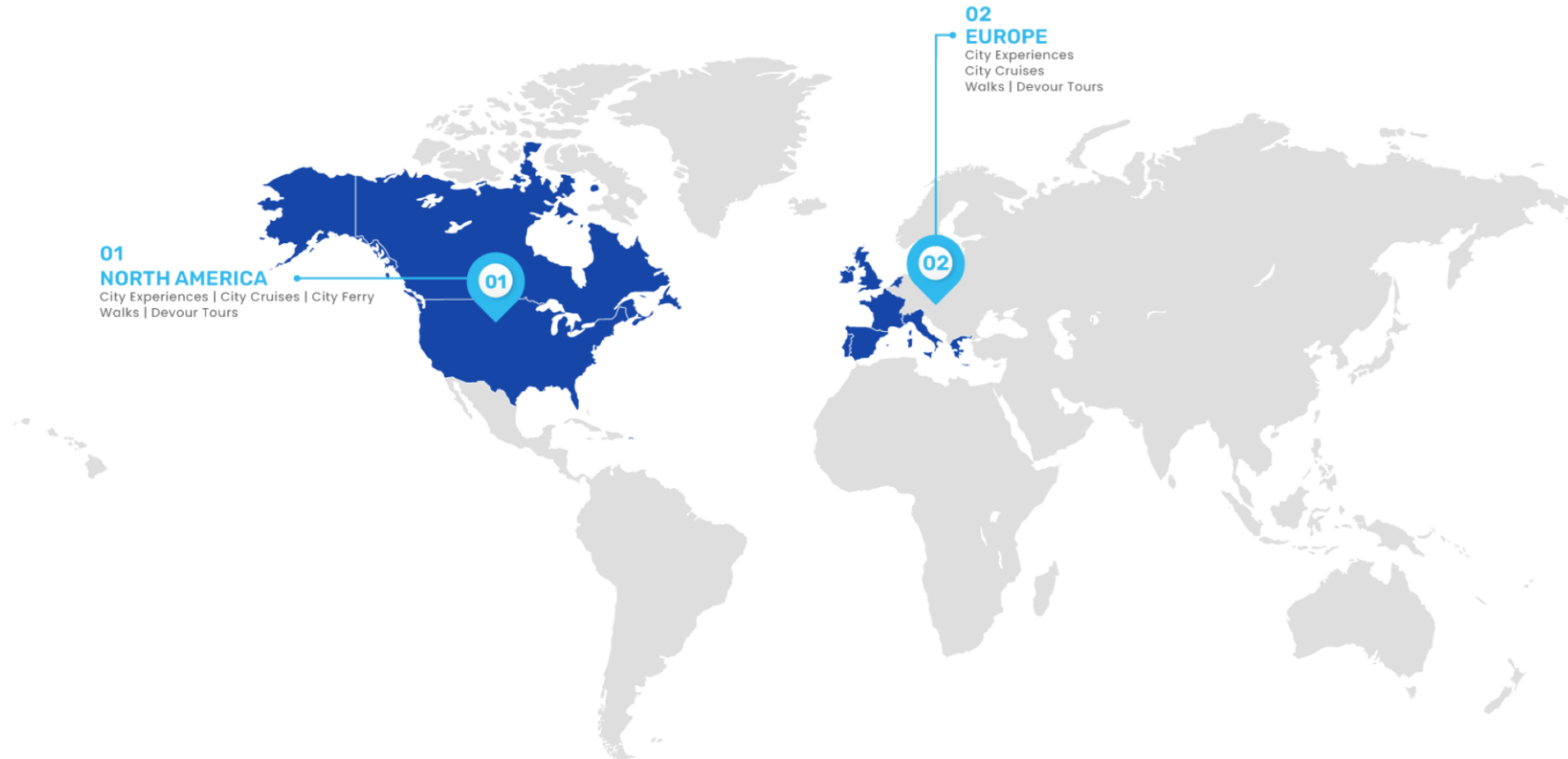

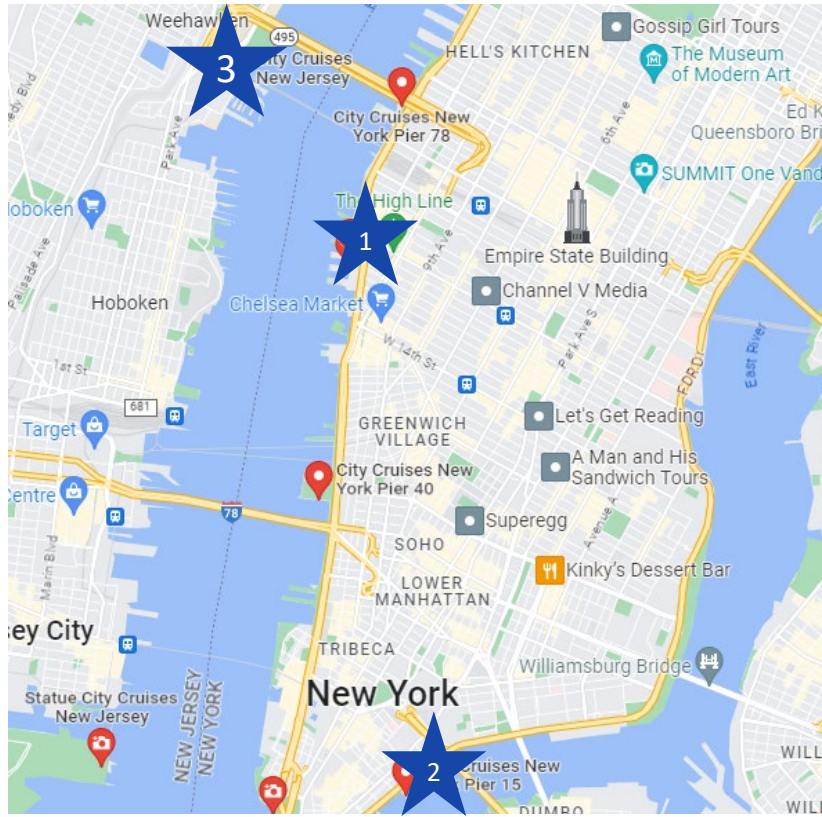

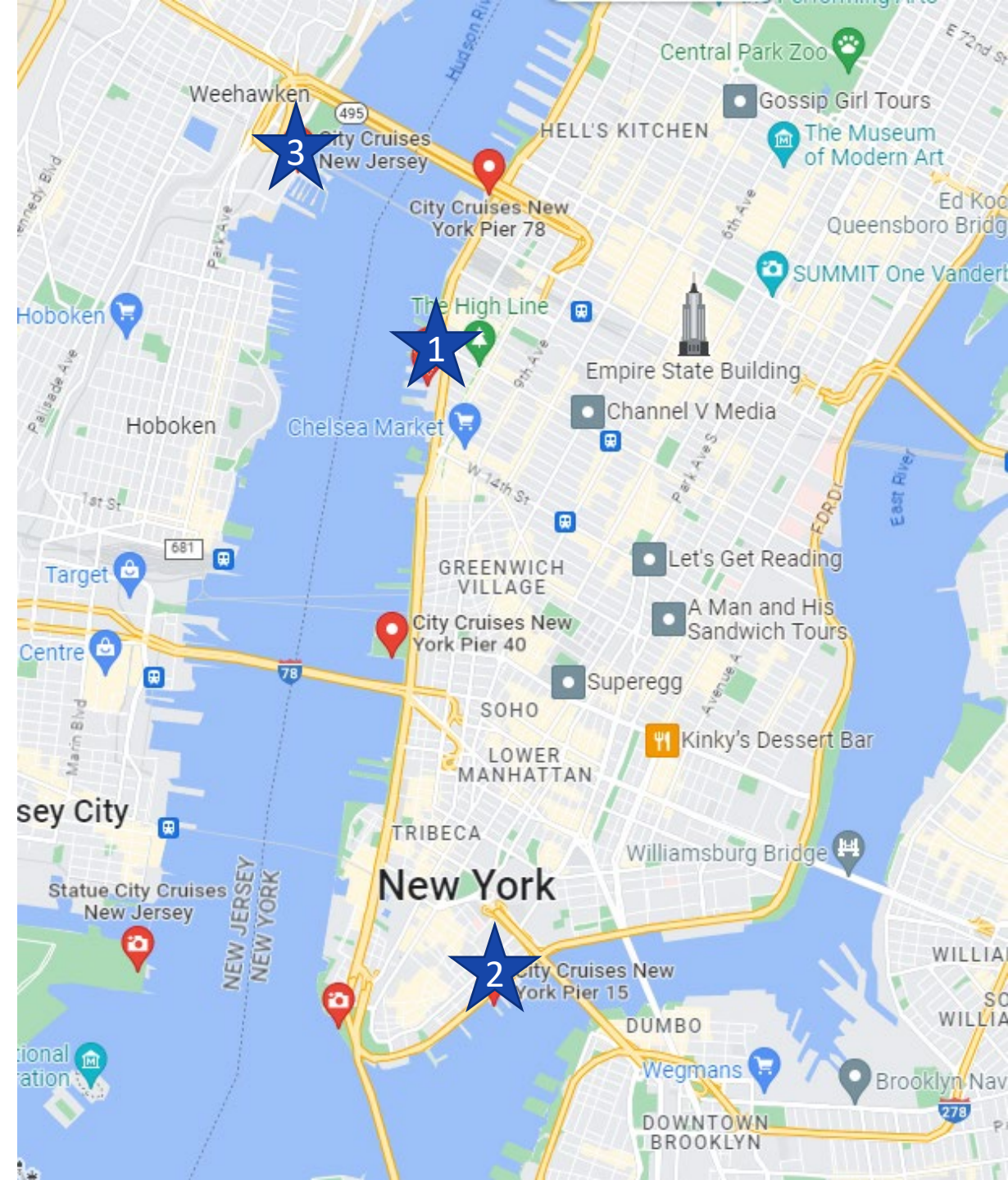

CHelsea PIERS: Completed in 1910 as a passenger ship terminal, it was supposed to be the destination of the ill-fated ocean liner Titanic. After years of disrepair, it was turned into a sports and entertainment complex in the mid-1990s and serves as the New York dock for City Cruises, Spirit Cruises, Bateaux New York and Atlantica.



LINCOLN HARBOR, NEW JERSEY: Home of the Lincoln Harbor Yacht club and conveniently located just across the Hudson from New York City, this marina is also home to over 60,000 square feet of retail shops and restaurants. Serves as the New Jersey Dock for City Cruises.



INTREPID SEA, AIR AND SPACE MUSEUM: Opened in 1982, the Museum is centered on the aircraft carrier Intrepid (CVS-11), one of the most successful ships in US history and now a national historic landmark.



EMPIRE STATE BUILDING: The Empire State Building is the World's Most Famous Office Building and stands 1,454 feet high. Opened in 1931 and built in 1 year and 45 days, it was the world's tallest building for 40 years. Observation decks on the 86th and 102nd floors offer guests panoramic views of the city.



VESSEL AT HUDSON YARDS: Hudson Yards is New York's newest neighborhood and home to more than 100 diverse shops and culinary experiences, offices for leaders in industry, significant public art and dynamic cultural institutions. The extraordinary centerpiece of Hudson Yards is its spiral staircase, a soaring new landmark meant to be climbed. This interactive artwork was imagined by Thomas Heatherwick and Heatherwick Studio.



CHRYSLER BUILDING: A classic example of Art Deco architecture and considered by many contemporary architects to be one of the finest buildings in NYC. At 1,046 feet, the structure was the world's tallest building for 11 months before it was surpassed by the Empire State Building. It was the headquarters for Chrysler from 1930 until the mid-1950s.



ONE WORLD TRADE CENTER: The National September 11 Memorial features two reflecting pools set within the footprint of the World Trade Center's twin towers and the 3000 names of those who lost their lives in terrorist attacks at this landmark. One World Trade Center, "The Freedom Tower," is the lead building of the new World Trade Center complex. One World Trade Center is the tallest building in the United States and the Western hemisphere by pinnacle height and among the tallest in the world, with its radio antenna reaching a symbolic 1,776 feet.



BATTERY PARK: Called "The Battery" by New Yorkers, this 20-acre park at the southern tip of Manhattan was originally the site of early Dutch fortifications in the 1600s. Its name originated from the battery of cannons installed there by the British during Colonial times.



BATTERY PARK CITY: This office and apartment community was built on the landfill from the excavation of the World Trade Center in 1977.



SOUTH STREET SEAPORT: Dating back to the 1600s, South Street and its Seaport District were once the world's gateway to New York City and America. After nearly a century of decay, the district was redeveloped in the 1960s into a vibrant commercial area filled with shops, restaurants, offices and the South Street Seaport Museum.



BROOKLYN BRIDGE: Regarded as one of the greatest architectural achievements of all time, it was designed by John Augustus Roebling and was constructed between 1869 and 1883. The bridge spans the East River connecting Brooklyn to Manhattan. The main span covers over 1,595 feet and its towers are nearly 275 feet tall.



BROOKLYN HEIGHTS: Considered New York's first suburb when it was developed in the 1820s, this charming residential section across the East River from Manhattan was originally accessible by steam ferry. It was declared New York's first landmark district in 1963.



MANHATTAN BRIDGE: The last of the three suspension bridges built across the lower East River. The lower level has three lanes, four subway tracks, a walkway and a bikeway. The upper level, originally used for streetcars, has two lanes in each direction.



WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE: At the time it was constructed, it set the record for the longest suspension bridge span on Earth. This bridge is among only two suspension bridges in New York City that still carry both automobile and rail traffic.



GOVERNORS ISLAND: These 173 acres were under military command from the 1700s through 1996, making it the oldest continuously operated military post in U.S. history.



STATUE OF LIBERTY: A gift to the people of America from the people of France, "Liberty Enlightening the World" stands 300 feet above New York Harbor. She was built by sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi and the infrastructure was designed by Gustav Eiffel.



ELLIS ISLAND: Nearly 17 million immigrants were processed here between 1892 and 1957 in their search of freedom of speech and religion as well as economic opportunities.



CENTRAL RAILROAD OF NEW JERSEY TERMINAL: Located at the north end of Liberty State Park, this beautiful 1892 structure was in operation until 1954. Over one half of the new arrivals at Ellis Island passed through this railroad terminal on their way to new lives across the United States.



COLGATE CLOCK: This stately timepiece once graced the Colgate Palmolive plant. When the factory was demolished in the 1980s, the clock remained. Built in 1924, its design was inspired by Colgate's Octagon Soap. It is considered the world's largest clock with a 50 foot diameter face and a minute hand that's 25 feet and 10 inches long. The surface of the clock is 1,963.5 square feet and the hour hand is 20 feet long.



ERIE LACKAWANNA: The former Erie Lackawanna Railroad and Ferry Terminal in Hoboken represents a hallmark of Beaux-Arts design. Completed in 1903, the copper-clad facility had fallen into disrepair by the time NJ Transit was formed in the early 1980s. It was the first place you could catch a train from the east coast to California on the west coast. Erie Lackawanna currently serves as the Hoboken stop on the PATH Train, NJ Transit trains, buses and Waterway ferry.

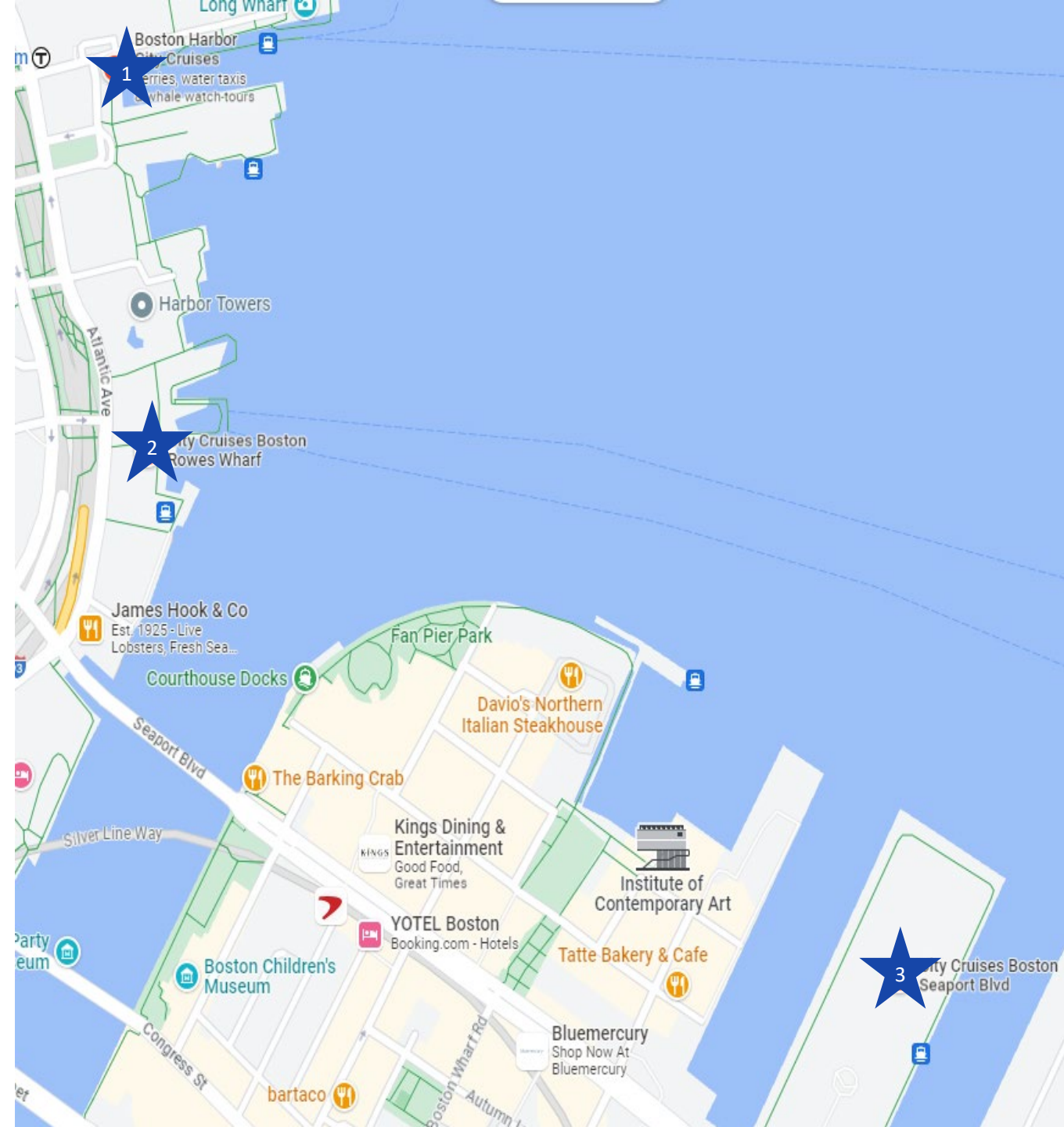

OLD IRONSIDES: The USS Constitution, also known as "Old Ironsides," earned her nickname because of her invincibility in battle. She was launched in 1797 and is the oldest fully commissioned naval vessel in the world.

2

OLD NORTH CHURCH: Built in 1723, this is the oldest church building in Boston. The first bells on the American continent sounded from Old North Church in 1744. Its steeple is best known for the lantern signal that sent Paul Revere on his famous ride.

3

BUNKER HILL MEMORIAL BRIDGE: The world's largest asymmetrical cable-stayed bridge is the northern point of entry into the city of Boston. It was built as part of the Big Dig — the largest highway construction project in the United States and was completed in March 2003. Its triangular cable resemble the sails of ships, much like those of the USS Constitution and its two towers pay homage to the nearby Bunker Hill Monument.

BUNKER HILL MONUMENT: This monument marks the site of the famous Battle of Bunker Hill, fought on June 17, 1775. The battle was significant as it was the first "pitched-battle" (a battle planned beforehand between opposing sides, as opposed to a chance encounter) between the colonies and the British Army. The obelisk stands 221 feet high and is composed of 3,000 granite blocks, all cut from the same quarry in nearby Quincy.

5

BOSTON TEA PARTY: The site of the infamous Boston Tea Party, where the Sons of Liberty, in protest of the Tea Act, threw British tea into Boston Harbor. Though the exact location of the event, Griffin's Wharf, is no longer standing, you can visit the official plaque that marks the original spot at the corner of Congress and Purchase Street. There is also a floating museum dedicated to the protest on the Congress Street Bridge.

THE SEAPORT DISTRICT: Also known as the South Boston Waterfront, the Seaport District is Boston's largest and youngest neighborhood. Home to The Institute of Contemporary Art, Boston Children's Museum, the Harbor Walk, many popular restaurants and ever-changing public art installations, the Seaport has evolved into a modern hot-spot in just a few short years.

BOSTON FISH PIER: The nation's oldest continuously working fish pier first opened in 1914 and was the most modern fish processing pier in the world. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2017 and is also home to another famous landmark, the No Name Restaurant, which has been in business since 1917. In more recent years, it hosts the famed Boston Seafood Festival in an effort to preserve, sustain and share Boston's maritime heritage.

8

LOGAN AIRPORT: Boston's Logan Airport covers 2,400 acres, has six runways and employs an estimated 17,000 people. Its distinctive 22-story control tower is one of Boston's iconic landmarks. From its beginning as a military base in 1923, it is now the largest airport in New England and the 19th busiest airport in the world, transporting 4 million passengers each month. At its busiest, an airplane will depart from or arrive Logan every 30 seconds!

CASTLE ISLAND: This 22 acre park is mostly recognized by the pentagon-shaped fort that sits at its tip, Fort Independence, built in 1934. This South Boston landmark also offers 3 miles of public beaches along its shoreline and is home to Sullivan's, a must-visit seaside restaurant. It's also a favorite spot to watch airplanes, as they fly directly overhead on their way to and from Logan Airport.

SPECTACLE ISLAND: Just a short boat ride away from Boston, Spectacle Island offers 5 miles of hiking trails, a swimming beach and the tallest point in Boston Harbor. In short, it is the best place for panoramic views of Boston. You would never know by looking at it, but Spectacle Island was used as the city landfill for 3 decades before it was filled in with dirt from the Big Dig and transformed into the beautiful public park that it is today.

11

DEER ISLAND: Deer Island has been connected to the mainland since the legendary 1938 hurricane, Shirley, filled the space with beach erosion. The Deer Island Waste Water Treatment Plant now sits on land that was once used as a hospital and the county prison. Today, its 2.6-mile shoreline path is a popular for walking, fishing and sightseeing for both residents and tourists.

BOSTON LIGHT ON LITTLE BREWSTER ISLAND: Little Brewster Island is actually the site of the first and second lighthouse in United States! The original Boston Light was built in 1716 and was the first lighthouse in the nation. However, when the British were evacuating the city on March 17, 1776, they blew it up as their fleet left the harbor. It was then reconstructed in 1783, making the Boston Light you see today, the second lighthouse in the United States. It is the oldest continually-manned light station in the country as well as the only lighthouse that still employs a keeper. Little Brewster Island is part of the outermost harbor islands called the Brewsters and is part of the National Park Service's Boston Harbor Islands Recreational Area.

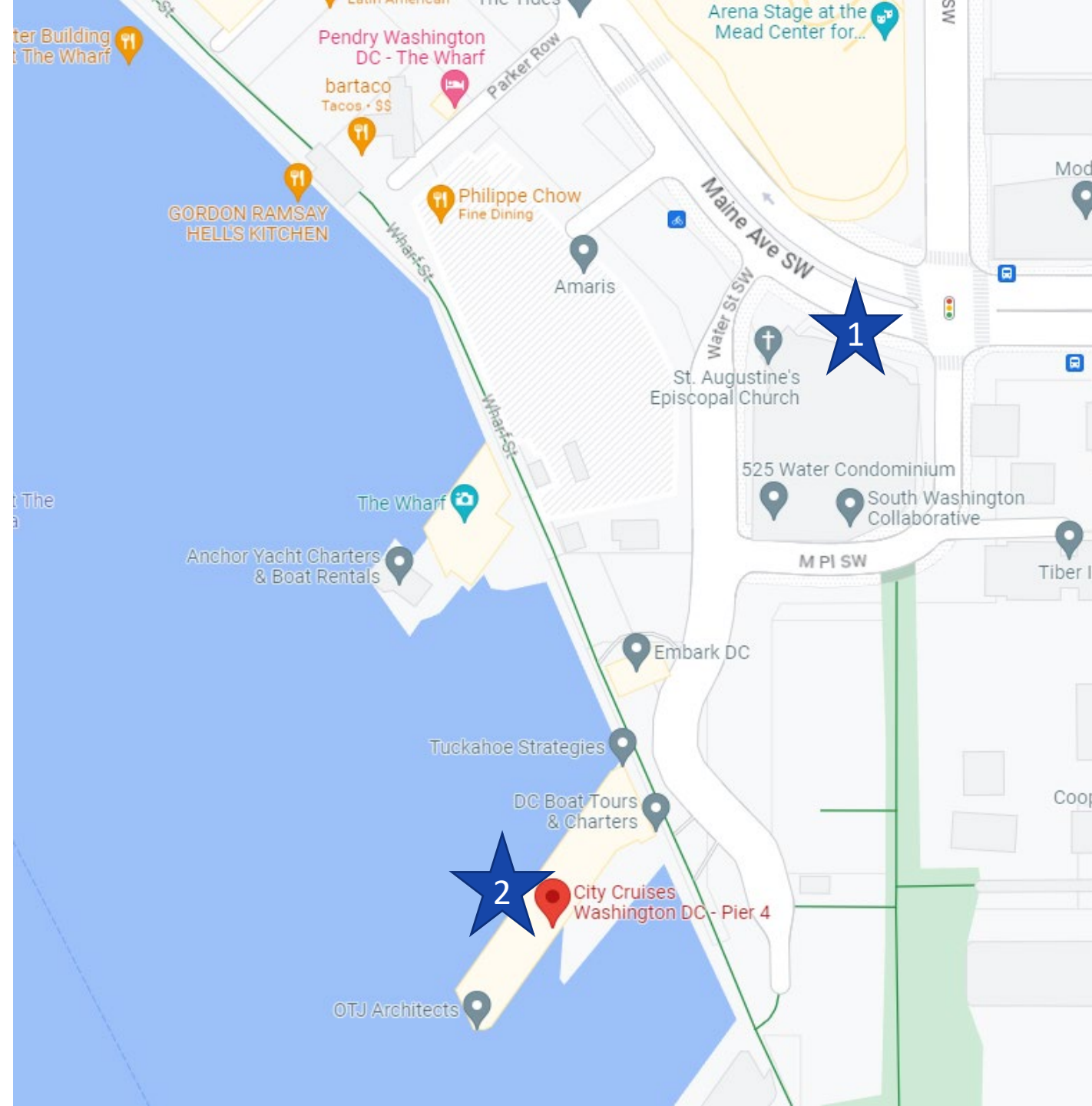

EAST POTOMAC PARK: Home to many of the Yoshino Cherry trees which are celebrated every spring during the National Cherry Blossom Festival.

2

FORT LESLEY J. MCNAIR: This military reservation was established in 1791 on about 28 acres at the tip of Greenleaf Point. Major Pierre Charles L'Enfant included it in his plans for Washington, the Federal City, as a major site for the defense of the capital.

3

US NAVAL RESEARCH LABORATORY: The US Naval Research Lab will celebrate it's 100th anniversary July 2, 2023. This Lab is significant for the accidental discovery of radar when ships got in the way during radio signal experiments between the lab and Hains Point in the 1920s.

4

NATIONAL HARBOR: A 300-acre multi-use waterfront development with a convention center, six hotels, restaurants, shops and condominiums.

5

OLD TOWN ALEXANDRIA: Founded in the early 1700s when a small tobacco warehouse on the waterfront spawned a small settlement.

6

REAGAN AIRPORT: As one of the busiest airports in the US, it averages one flight every 30 seconds at peak periods — that's about 900 flights on a busy day. Despite this, it's one of the safest airports in the US.

7

JEFFERSON MEMORIAL: Dedicated on April 13, 1943, the 200th anniversary of Thomas Jefferson's birth. While its shape is an obvious nod to the Pantheon of Rome, it also mirrors the University of Virginia rotunda, a structure designed by Jefferson himself.

8

ARLINGTON CEMETERY: Site of President John F. Kennedy's grave and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

9

ARLINGTON MEMORIAL BRIDGE: Designed to be an "Avenue of Heroes," it is lined with monuments and memorials to such diverse figures as Admiral Byrd, the Seabees, Valor, and Sacrifice.

10

ROOSEVELT ISLAND/ROOSEVELT BRIDGE: Named for President Theodore Roosevelt, who established many of the nation's national parks, this is a popular site for hiking, biking and walking.

11

FRANCIS SCOTT KEY BRIDGE: More commonly known as the Key Bridge, is a six-lane reinforced concrete arch bridge. Washington's oldest surviving bridge across the Potomac River.

12

GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY: Georgetown University is a private research university in Washington, D.C. Founded in 1789, it is the oldest Catholic and Jesuit institution of higher education in the United States.

13

WATERGATE HOTEL: One of Washington's premier addresses, it is best known for the incident that eventually led to President Richard Nixon's resignation.

14

JOHN F. KENNEDY CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS: Opened in 1971, the Kennedy Center is considered a Washington jewel and a career Mecca for performers across all media.

15

LINCOLN MEMORIAL: White marble structure was patterned after a Greek Temple. Thirty-six Doric columns ring the building, each representing a state of the Union at the time of Lincoln's death.

16

WASHINGTON MEMORIAL: Built to commemorate George Washington, this 555 feet high obelisk is the tallest free standing stone structure in the world.

17

UNITED STATES CAPITOL: The meeting place of the United States Congress, the legislature of the federal government of the United States.

- 1 FORT LESLEY J. MCNAIR:** This military reservation was established in 1791 on about 28 acres at the tip of Greenleaf Point. Major Pierre Charles L'Enfant included it in his plans for Washington, the Federal City, as a major site for the defense of the capital.
- 2 NATIONAL WAR COLLEGE:** The National War College (NWC) of the United States is a school in the National Defense University. Most mid-level and senior military officers study at the NWC in preparation for higher positions.
- 3 DEFENSE INTELLIGENCE AGENCY:** Located on Bolling Air Force Base, the Defense Intelligence Agency is the central producer and manager of military intelligence for the United States Department of Defense.
- 4 US NAVAL RESEARCH LABORATORY:** The US Naval Research Lab will celebrate its 100th anniversary July 2, 2023. This Lab is significant for the accidental discovery of radar when ships got in the way during radio signal experiments between the lab and Hains Point in the 1920s.
- 5 WOODROW WILSON BRIDGE:** The Woodrow Wilson Bridge is the only active drawbridge on the Potomac at this time. It's the southern-most of 7 crossings of the Potomac in DC and the last bridge for approximately 50 miles downriver.
- 6 NATIONAL Harbor:** A 300-acre multi-use waterfront development with a convention center, six hotels, restaurants, shops and condominiums.
- 7 GAYLORD HOTEL:** Opened on April 1, 2008, has 2,000 rooms and a 470,000 square foot convention center. It's the largest non-gaming hotel and convention center on the eastern seaboard.

- 8 FORT WASHINGTON:** Built to defend the city of Washington from river attacks, construction on Fort Washington started in about 1808 but had not gotten far when the Capital City was burnt by the British in the "War of 1812." The fort was named in honor of General George Washington who surveyed the location.
- 9 MOUNT VERNON:** Home of George Washington. It was there that George Washington lived until his death in 1799. Both he and his wife are buried on the property. Mt. Vernon, at one time, consisted of 8,000 acres; it was divided into five working farms.
- 10 OLD TOWN ALEXANDRIA:** Alexandria was first established in the 1600s by Scottish and English tobacco merchants. Early settlers envisioned a bustling port, and Alexandria was the 3rd largest port in the country. However, as ships grew larger, the deeper and more accessible ports of Baltimore and Norfolk overshadowed Alexandria.
- 11 GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC TEMPLE:** This memorial was based on the design of the ancient lighthouse in Alexandria, Egypt, which was one of the seven ancient wonders of the world. It stands at 333 feet and features an outstanding collection of Washington Memorabilia.
- 12 REAGAN NATIONAL AIRPORT:** As one of the busiest airports in the US., it averages one flight every 30 seconds at peak periods — that's about 900 flights on a busy day. Despite this, it's one of the safest airports in the US.
- 13 WASHINGTON MONUMENT:** The Washington Monument is over 555 feet tall, making it the tallest free-standing stone sculpture in the world. There are no reinforcements to hold the stones together — just the weight of the stones and the way they are fitted together.
- 14 UNITED STATES CAPITOL:** The meeting place of the United States Congress, the legislature of the federal government of the United States. Located in Washington, D.C., it sits atop Capitol Hill at the eastern end of the National Mall.
